RALLYING

Last weekend, 71 crews made it to North Yorkshire for the latest round of the Historic Rally Car Register Championship.

This included Badwell Ash-based Robin Shackleton, who was again driving an MGB Roadster, with the car's owner, Ken Dobbs, in the navigator's seat.

The Ilkley Rally, organised by Ilkley MC, saw them bring the car home in 28th, a position which could have been better, had the oil pipe to the oil pressure gauge not split.

Noticing a lack of pressure, the team made a temporary repair and, along with six pints of oil, completed the rally.

In race one, his car was well suited to the wet conditions and, following a midfield grid position, he went away to secure eighth overall and victory in his class. Race two again saw a wet track to begin with, but as it dried out so the Sprite was unable to stay with the more powerful cars, but still rewarded Tony with 11th overall, second in class.

Peter Chappel continued to gain experience in his Austin Healy Sprite, and safely completed both of his races.
